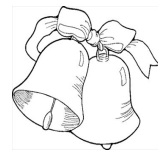


IN OUR PARISH

The focus on Passion or Palm Sunday is usually on the palms or greenery that people waved as they accompanied Jesus into the city. But there was another item or "prop" in the scene which receives less attention – the cloaks of the disciples and people. For many people the cloak was a precious item, one of their few possessions, and putting it on the ground or on the back of an animal meant the risk of damage, or worse still, of losing it in the confusion.

Jesus was about to enter into the events that would result in his crucifixion. He knew that the time was close, but the people did not. For him the cloaks may have foreshadowed the cloths that would soon wrap his body as Joseph of Arimathea placed him in the tomb. As the crowd used their cloaks as a means of recognizing his status and dignity, so Joseph would later bring a shroud to wrap Jesus and give him dignity in death and burial.

What would we have done in the crowd that day as Jesus rode by? Thrown our cloaks on the ground or wrapped them more tightly around ourselves?

There is no right or wrong answer to these questions. What matters is what the cloak represents in our lives. It may represent the identity our job or profession cloaks us in, which hides the real person from others. It could be a job which we cannot put at risk because without it our family would have serious difficulties. The cloak might be our self-control, exercised to the point where we find it hard to respond spontaneously to the needs of others. It could be a sense of inferiority or superiority which shapes how we want to appear to others. Our cloak could be something we genuinely need for our physical or mental health, and which we truly cannot risk losing.

Whatever the cloak is and whatever we would have done with it when Jesus passed by, it is our understanding that matters. If we kept it because we genuinely need it for our well-being or that of others, then gratitude for the cloak in our lives is our response to Jesus riding on the colt. If the cloak is something we use to create an image, to hide behind or to separate ourselves emotionally from others, then we need to consider how we could let it go. If we choose to cast our cloak in front of Jesus we need to do it with freedom and joy, as a genuine gift, knowing who he is and what the cloak represents for us. It would be better to keep the cloak than to surrender it just to follow the crowd. If we followed the crowd on Palm Sunday we might have been tempted to do the same later in the week, when the crowd demanded that Jesus be crucified.

Come and join us on **Holy Thursday** evening as we celebrate the solemn Mass of the Lord's Supper at 8:00 pm. We watch as Jesus share:

His last Passover meal with His friends. We hear Jesus giving us the Sacrament of the Eucharist He tells us, "Do this in remembrance of me." We experience the Washing of the Feet as sign and symbol of the service we are called to live.

Good Friday is the most solemn day of the year, a day of fasting and abstinence, a day of prayer. It is "Good" Friday, the day when God did wonderful things for us by the suffering and death of his Son. Out of his death God has brought us light and life, making it possible for us to be saved. This is indeed a good day for the world. Cancel any plans to treat this as a day off from work or school. Join us at 3:00 pm for the Liturgy of the Passion of the Lord as we unite our pains, fears, and suffering to the cross, sacrificing all for the Kingdom of God.

Be with us at 8:00 pm next Saturday for the **Solemn Easter Vigil** -the most important celebration of the Church year and first Easter Mass, or join us at 10:30 Mass on Easter Sunday morning as we celebrate the Life that makes all life worth living. We rejoice because Christ has been raised from the dead and because we are renewed in him.

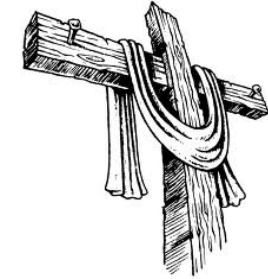
