

## IN OUR PARISH

### *The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick*



Developed from the practice of the apostles (Mk 6.13) and of the early Church (Jas 5.14-15), this sacrament has been renewed in recent years and is a sacrament is for the living. It is a ritual of healing appropriate not only for physical but also for mental and spiritual sickness. During the reception of the sacrament, the priest lays his hands on the sick person's head and then rubs blessed oil on the person's forehead and hands, saying a brief prayer.

Who can be anointed? The Church offers the sacrament of anointing to those who are seriously or who are feeble because of old age. This includes those who suffer from serious chronic illnesses; patients before serious surgery; elderly people who are weak; sick children old enough to understand and be comforted by the sacrament. Those who have a serious mental illness and who would be strengthened by the sacrament may also be anointed.

**Thursday, February 11th marks World Day of the Sick 2016.** The theme this year is *“Entrusting Oneself to the Merciful Jesus like Mary: “Do whatever he tells you” (Jn 2:5) To mark this occasion, the Sacrament of the Sick will be offered in our parish at Saturday and Sunday Mass next weekend ( February 6th & 7th).* All who feel they are in need of the graces and strength of the sacrament are invited to receive the sacrament.

## REFLECTION



### **Truly Something**

The Second Reading explains that a lot of people who look as if they are truly something are really nothing.

We are accustomed to a disconnection between appearance and reality when it comes to the greatness of people. We know that someone can be very rich and be a complete jerk. Someone can be very famous, a great scientist or a great beauty in the movies, and be a pathetic human being. Someone can be very powerful, in a company, in a nation, and be a totally rotten person. So we know that you can have riches, or fame, or power, and yet be a thorough-going loser.

What we are less accustomed to thinking about is the disconnection between the appearance of greatness and the reality when it comes to spiritual things. And that is what the Second Reading calls to our attention. Someone can be rich in religious experiences, prophesying or speaking in tongues, and yet just be a self-aggrandizing jerk. Someone can be famous for self-sacrificial care of the poor, and still be only a pathetically swollen ego of a person. Someone can have the power even to do miracles, healing the sick or moving mountains, and nonetheless be rotten to the core with arrogance and pride. You might look as if you were truly something, as far as your spiritual life goes. You might have spiritual riches, fame, or power, and still be nothing, as the Second Reading says. But if even those who speak in tongues or care for the poor or heal the sick can be nothing, then what on earth does it take for a person to be truly something?

The Second Reading explains it: it takes love.

No human person can be anything unless he is in the image of his Creator. But God is a consuming fire of love. And so, without love, no matter what other kind of apparent greatness you may have, in reality you are nothing. You are only something if, like God, you are on fire with love.

True love is not a warm feeling of affection which tries to please everybody and never rock the boat. Rather, it is like God's love: willing to get killed in order to bring true good to those it loves. And, like God's love, it embraces everybody. That kind of love is truly something! And we are nothing unless we have it.
